



The Ottoman state began as a local Turkish dynasty following the breakdown of the empire of the Seljuk Turks, and within the course of seven centuries expanded into a powerful, multinational, multilingual empire controlling much of Southeast Europe, Western Asia, the Caucasus and North Africa, then dissolved with the collapse of the empire leading to the emergence of new modern states in the area.

Bursa in 1326 and Edirne in 1361, each in turn became the capital of the empire. Istanbul, conquered in 1453, held the status of being an important capital for almost five centuries until the foundation of the Republican Turkey in 1923.

Each of these capitals through selected sites, buildings and monuments preserved in good state, represent different phases of Ottoman architecture and somehow demonstrate a relation, a continuity with the history and culture of the Ottoman realm. Bahcesehir Summer School on the Ottoman Capitals, aims to concentrate on a study of exploring historical architectural traces. in their original settings.
